

Resolution submitted by Turkey merged with Greece

Concerning The urgent need for abolishing the consistent conflict in Cyprus in order to provide a secure national economy to its citizens.

The General Assembly,

Conscious of the inability of two communities to agree to a set of governing principles and institutions for the last forty years;

Reminding the member states of the UN peacekeepers established as “buffers” in Cyprus since 1974;

Citing the disruption in tourism due to the country’s political instability, and separation of vast natural and mineral resources that can otherwise be empowering to Cyprus’s weak economy;

Emphasizing that the main goal of the official negotiators since 1974 has been to engage the two parties in substantive negotiations that could lead to a reconstitution of the Cyprus nation, small progress has been made but apparently have not come close to a settlement;

Highlighting that the Republic of Cyprus was founded as a state based on the equal partnership of two ethnic communities Greece and Turkey, yet unfortunately this has resulted in occurring dismantled conflict instead of a peaceful partnership.

DECIDES: An international conference is to be organized involving the leaders of all the concerned countries; Greece, Turkey and Cyprus in addition to other major influential countries such as the United States of America, Great Britain, France, Germany, Russia and Japan in order to resolve all the fundamental factious issues and raise incentives and financial aids to support the reunion of two communities in the island.
